Tickets Released 40 minutes before Showtime




Step 1 Select your films. Lines form early for the most popular films. Some theatres are small.

Step 2 40 minutes before show time: Line up to get your numbered ticket. First-in-line, first-served basis with a valid pass. Your ticket guarantees you a seat. Doors open just 10 minutes later, 30 minutes before show time. You must have a ticket to enter.

Tip: Subtract 40 minutes from screen time to get your ticket. For example:

9:00 show -> tickets released 8:20 9:15 show -> tickets released 8:35 9:30 show -> tickets released 8:50

Latecomers: If you're a passholder arriving after the doors open, see the theatre manager (wearing a black PTFF baseball hat) for a numbered ticket. If the house is sold out, you will have time to select a different film.



NW Maritime Center 200 seats

431 Water Street, Floor 2, Elevator. Patrons standing in line see stellar views of the Bay, Admiralty Inlet, Cascade and Olympic Mountains.

Films start here 15 minutes after the hour. NEW! Maritime Makeover. Now one big screen. Big sound and auditorium. You can now read subtitles.

Key City Free Theatre 66 seats

419 Washington Street Four films screened daily, free of charge. Location of the Peter Simpson Free Cinema, in honor of Peter Simpson, a founder and past Executive Director of PTFF. *Films start here 30 minutes after the hour.*

The Starlight Room 45 seats 237 Taylor Street, Floor 3, Elevator. *Ages 21+ only*. Appetizers, entrees, popcorn, and alcoholic beverages available. *Films start here on the hour*.

Taylor Street Outdoor Theatre Straw bales for seating, or bring chairs and blankets.

PTFF Awards Scholarships to 16 Film Students

For the fifth year, 16 film and journalism students were selected to attend the Port Townsend Film Festival on a scholarship.

Scholarships include one night of lodging at Fort Worden State Park, Festival passes and access to the private Filmmaker's Lounge. While in Port Townsend for the weekend, they also attend filmmaker's panels and are invited to special events.

Addressing the value of student involvement, David Shulman, director of the Seattle Film Institute stressed the importance of students seeing new work and meeting film professionals. Rick Riski, Peninsula College professor, guides his journalism students to cover the festival and practice interviews, all skills they'll need as professional writers.

We lost a great champion of the Port Townsend Film Festival this year with Frank Buxton's passing in January. The support Frank gave, along with that of his wife, Cynthia Sears, was key in getting the festival off the ground, and kept it flying all these wonderful years.

Frank's career in the entertainment industry is immense, but here are some highlights: He performed in NY as a stand-up comedian, toured Australia as the star of "Bye Bye Birdie", hosted the TV series, "Discovery", created his own award-winning series, "Hot Dog", and then went on to write and direct in Hollywood for Gary Marshall on such shows as "The Odd Couple", "Happy Days", and "Mork and Mindy." And all this after starting in summer stock at 19 and appearing with his hero, Buster Keaton! PTFF honors Frank's love of silent films with the showing of Steamboat Bill, Jr., one of his favorites.

Frank loved PTFF and often remarked that a cherished moment was standing in the warm September sun in front of the Rose Theatre, with the smell of straw bales, talking about the film he'd just seen, hearing others describe the ones they had watched, and getting advice about which film to see next.

Frank continues to be with us in spirit, and would want us all to say ONWARD, PTFF!


"Miles and Karina" are David Miles Keenan and Nova Karina Devonie from Seattle WA.

This duo formed in 1996 after cowgirl supergroup "Ranch Romance" hung up their spurs. They were members of the group for five years.

Their music is influenced by recordings from the 40's, 50's and 60's and includes virtually all American styles. Karina plays the accordion and glockenspiel and Miles plays guitar, banjo, fiddle and percussion, and they both sing. Miles and Karina are two powerful musicians who use their powers for good. Delightfully quirkish!

"Miles and Karina" have released three CDs on Sugar Hill Records of mostly original music, songs of food, heartbreak, dancing, shopping... always with a sense of humor and always with compelling melodies and tones. They are well known as composers of silent film scores, with several commissions, one of which is Buster Keaton's *Steamboat Bill, Jr.*

10 GUEST PROFILE: DANNY GLOVER

Danny Glover is a most unusual PTFF special guest. True, he's a much lauded film actor, with over 200 films to his credit, including the lead role in *The Color Purple*. He's the founder of the Robey Theatre Co., and a film director. Not to mention that he's famous for his role as Detective Roger Murtaugh, in the comedy action film franchise - *Lethal Weapon*.


But prior to becoming an actor, Danny Glover worked in community development. And a substantial amount of Glover's lifework has been as a spokesperson for human rights.

"I am so excited to have him here, in a town that is politically active, socially engaged and passionate about the way we treat out fellow citizens," PTFF Executive Director Janette Force said of Glover. "Our past guests have talked about acting and directing, Danny is most interested in talking about social justice and the greater good of the world."

"The dynamics in our world are changing rapidly, and new information is in our face all the time," Glover told CBS News after receiving the NAACP Image Award earlier this year. "We have new ways of looking at the world. For the young people who will inhabit this planet, it's essential that we create a culture of sustainable activism."

When asked which of his films PTFF should screen at Friday's Special Evening, Glover chose **To Sleep With Anger**, (directed by Charles Burnett), which has been lauded as a masterpiece. A meditation about the Devil, the film won four Independent Spirit Awards, including Best Director and Best Screenplay, Best Male Lead (Danny Glover) and Best Supporting Female (Sheryl Lee Ralph). It also won the National Society of Film Critics Award for Best Screenplay and a Special Jury Prize at Sundance Film Festival where it premiered in 1990.

The process that led to Glover's PTFF recruitment was something of a high-wire

act. It began when PTFF's new operations manager, Sonny Flores, mentioned that he had met Danny Glover in 2011. Flores was the manager of the hospice ward at the California Medical Facility in Vacaville when he received a call from Nane Alejanderez, executive director of Barrios Unidos, saying that Mr. Glover was interested in visiting the prison's facility and asked Flores if that could be arranged.

Glover paid a visit, and Flores was impressed by his compassion, humanity and lack of pretense. "He was very informal, and very laid back. He went in to see people who were on their deathbed, took their hands, and acted as if he'd always known them. He wasn't afraid to engage with the inmates at all."

Flores contacted Alejanderez and asked if Glover would consider appearing at PTFF. We know the answer. The only obstacle was to schedule his appearance around Glover's combined commitments of filmmaking and public appearances as both a UNICEF Goodwill ambassador, and on behalf of numerous human rights issues.

Most of Glover's recent interviews on camera and in print, center around social issues. For example, in mid-July, Glover joined Aborigines to lobby the Australian parliament to rewrite the country's constitution to include the rights of indigenous peoples.

The Guardian reported that, "in his address, Glover spoke of the similar histories of subjugation and exploitation in Australia and the US, and historical links between unions and campaigns for civil rights in both countries."

Glover likes to send social messages, "Lethal Weapon could be considered a message piece," He told Hype magazine in Dec. 2017. "I was a black actor playing a role that could have been played by any actor. That's a political statement; that's a social statement in itself. Those things change attitudes–and however slightly they do it, they do it."

In YES! Magazine's August, 2018 issue: "I've been fortunate to be in some films which I think spark discussions," he said. "The interesting thing about *The Color Purple* is the issue around the exploitation of women, spousal abuse, and other aspects like that, which adds to an enormous discussion. It was phenomenal back in the day, and that same discussion is going on right now as in 1986."
