

For the first time, awards will be presented in five categories: Business Leader of the Year, Citizen of the Year, Rising Entrepreneur, Young Professional of the Year, and Future Business Leader.

Nominations are open to individuals participating in a business or organization in Jefferson County – Chamber membership is not a requirement – and will be accepted from Jan. 1-31, 2019.

neur and Future Business Leader. The Rising Entrepreneur Award will be presented to an individual who embodies the entrepreneurial spirit and innovative thinking that will lead Jefferson County to sustained economic prosperity, and who demonstrates a commitment to business and economic development.

"The growth of new market sectors in Jefferson County has been on the rise for some time and we are proud of the entrepreneurs growing business, manufacturing and

jobs in our community," JCCC Executive Director Arlene Alen said. "The time has come to recognize them."

The new Future Business Leader Award will be given to a high school senior who displays leadership qualities every day, serves as a role model to their peers, and succeeds in academics as well as community service.

"We are excited at the growth of our community and our commitment to recognizing the individuals who now and will in the future lead

Jefferson County," Alen added.

From the nominations received, the Nominating Committee will select three individuals per category for formal nomination. Award winners will be announced at the April 7 event.

Since its founding in 1997, the Port Townsend Brewing Company has grown from bottling just two of its signature beers to more than 10 for a market that extends across the Puget Sound region from Bellingham to Olympia.

Mixing Music & Microbrews

Located in the Port of Port Townsend Boat Haven, the Port Townsend Brewing Company's tasting room is open seven days a week and features live music year-round. Local and regionally-known musicians can be heard on Saturday nights during the winter months, while the brewery's expanded outdoor beer garden plays host to live music four nights a week in the summertime. Visit www.porttownsend-brewing.com/events for the brewery's upcoming events schedule.

The brewery's microbrews can also be enjoyed at weddings and special events, as

the brewery offers its kegs, glassware and taps for event rentals, including for those held out of town. Event planners are encouraged to visit the brewery for a free consultation and tasting to ensure the right style and amount of beer is chosen for their event

Pints of Support

As the company has grown over the years, so, too, has it evolved into being a major sponsor of events in Port Townsend. Kim estimates the brewery has donated more than \$10,000 worth of beer per year over the past 21 years through beer gardens at community events, which include

the Northwest Maritime Center, Centrum Blues, Jazz and Fiddle Tunes, Port Townsend Film Festival, and Edensaw Community Cancer Foundation.

“One of the things we have been very proud of is to be able to participate with the local non-profits by helping them raise money for their organizations by providing donated beer to them,” Kim said. “Helping the community is important to us.”

Our local companies never cease to amaze us with their innovation and the broad reach of their products and services – regionally, nationally and internationally. Each month, we will highlight a local business that is an innovative and rising sector leader whose entrepreneurship is expanding and adding to the local economy and strengthening our workforce.

Olympic Research Inc.

Yes, you can do big-time research and development on the Olympic Peninsula. With a history of R&D in energy and environment markets, Olympic Research Inc. co-founder and President Bill Lowry decided to leave his corporate management position six years ago to develop something that matters.

His first opportunity was a research grant for the U.S. Department of Energy, funded through the Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) Program. The challenge was to develop new sealing technologies for nuclear fuel disposal in deep granite deposits, as an alternative to the shallow geologic storage currently being considered for the nation's nuclear waste. The solution was to use highly modified energetic thermite materials to form ceramic plugs and seals in place, under water and at great depth.

Out of that seed funding, Olympic Research Inc. is growing and working with other government and commercial customers to apply the technology to decom-

missioning of wells in oil and gas, geothermal, and carbon sequestration markets. The company is currently in negotiations with a startup providing decommissioning technologies in the North Sea, addressing a critical environmental challenge on a very big scale.

"It is tempting to think we are too remote to support this type of R&D," Bill said, "but we have such an effective supply network to get equipment and materials, and surprisingly capable local machine shop and technical services, we can do world-class research without having to be in a population center."

And we live in a place where technical people

like to live, work, and play. Olympic Research Inc. has three full-time employees (with engineering and science backgrounds) working in its Glen Cove facility and will be growing to support an upcoming commercial opportunity.

Bill is also the president of the Economic Development Council of Jefferson County (EDC Team Jefferson) Board of Directors, bringing his experience in the SBIR programs to help other companies in the area. EDC Team Jefferson supports startups by advising on the various federal small business financial assistance programs. Innovative funding opportunities are also being developed to attract existing small special technology firms to the area, and help existing firms obtain capital for growth. Search is on for Port Townsend's Second City Manager

It's been 20 years since Port Townsend changed to a city manager/council form of governance and our inaugural manager, David Timmons, is planning to depart for a well-deserved retirement this June. To assist the City Council in preparing for the new hire and to keep the community apprised of the job position search, an open house was held Nov. 29, 2018, and a city-wide survey has been distributed and collected.

The survey asked:

- What are our most important city issues?
- What leadership qualities are most critical for a successful manager?
- How does the community envision manager/community interaction?
- What should the council consider during the hiring process?
- What advice should the prospective manager receive?

These are all great questions and can serve as helpful prompts for community members to remain involved and assist the council in its search for an experienced and talented replacement. In order to determine what we would like our new manager to do, it might be helpful to know what the outgoing manager accomplished.

A cursory review of the City Council's annual reports for the last two decades would reveal an extensive list of completed capital projects, city government managerial alignments, and responses to unplanned community impacts. It may be surprising to look back when not so long ago there were three fewer docks in service on the waterfront (Union Wharf, City Dock, and the Northwest Maritime Center), the fire hall and library on Lawrence Street were in need of repair, and the summer ferry lines stretched back to Kearney Street.

A sideways measurement of a city manager's worth is the frequency of disruptions for replacing and enhancing aging water, sewer, and sidewalk infrastructure. The reports would also include the undergrounding of power lines and downtown's "Front Street" returning. From City Hall seismic retrofit to the Mountain View addition, the management of the community's resources is entrusted to this office.

The job search is beginning. It's in the best interest of the community to stay involved in the hiring process.
