Sustainable Hospitality and Ecotourism at the Old Alcohol Plant Inn and Bayside Housing

The Old Alcohol Plant Inn is open year-round and overlooks the stunning views and wildlife of the Port Townsend Bay. The Inn's garden-to-table restaurant, Spirits Bar and Grill, serves entrees prepared with fresh produce from the property's two acres of edible landscaping. The mission of the OAP is to support the non-profit organization Bayside Housing and Services, which provides transitional housing, meals, and wrap-around services for people facing homelessness. Before the term "sustainability" became commonplace, OAP and Bayside leadership created a holistic plan to guide their social, environmental, and economic goals as they strive to offer eco-tourism hospitality and transitional housing for the local community.

"We believe having a sustainability plan allows us to turn goals into reality and become a driver for developing sustainable practices in the hospitality industry. We need the plan to be a part of the increasing demands of the environmental challenges in our local area as well as our world," managing director Gary Keister remarks. In the fall of 2021, the OAP hired a part-time sustainability manager to help research and implement holistic and eco-friendly strategies.

Every department has met a variety of eco-friendly goals, ranging from the elimination of single use plastics to harvesting over 6,000 pounds of produce



for garden-to-table dining. Significant energy reductions were made by head of maintenance, John Risinger, with the transition to LED lighting and low-flow faucets in sinks, showers, and tubs. Other sustainability efforts* made by various OAP departments include:

Spirits Bar and Grill:

- Garden-grown produce travels .04 food miles to fill the plates of OAP and Bayside meals.
- Locally sourced beer on tap supports our local economy and has a greatly decreased carbon footprint compared to bottled, domestic beer.
- Composted kitchen scraps reduce methane-producing landfill waste by 20 gallons per week.
- Paper straws replaced plastic straws and to-go boxes are compostable.
- Used kitchen oil is recycled and turned into biodiesel by Sequential.

Gardens:

 Since 2018, gardeners Kira Mardikes and Patrick Ryland have utilized local manure, seaweed, food scraps, and nutrient-dense amendments to create rich compost. Biochar, a carbon-sequestering soil builder, is also incorporated.

The Inn and Housekeeping:


- Head of housekeeping, Kim Risinger, has • transitioned to non-toxic cleaning products.

Climate Change in Jefferson County

Climate change has two different but important aspects preparing for climate impacts and reducing our greenhouse gas emissions to do our part to reduce the magnitude of climate impacts worldwide. Work on both aspects is under way in Jefferson County, but certainly there is much more to be done.

Climate change impacts projected for Jefferson County, which are described in detail in the Climate Change Preparedness Plan for the North Olympic Peninsula include hotter and drier summers, reduced snowpack. increased wildfire risks and smoke, and drought. Increased precipitation in fall and winter is also projected, which can cause road washouts, fallen trees, and impacts to stormwater systems. Other projected impacts include rising sea levels, which can cause coastal flooding, and ocean acidification, which can impact a variety of marine life. There are also a range of public health impacts related to the above, including dehydration and heatstroke from extreme heat, water quality issues related to increased harmful algal blooms, and mental health impacts due to increased frequency of extreme weather events.

Jefferson County and the City of Port Townsend formed the joint Climate Action Committee (CAC) back in 2008, and jointly adopted a goal to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions to 80% lower than 1990 levels by 2050. A recent update to the county-wide greenhouse gas inventory showed we are making progress, but there is more to do to reduce emissions. Many organizations in Jefferson County participated in workshops developing the Climate Change Preparedness Plan noted above, and have been taking a variety of actions to prepare, including planning for climate change when updating their water supply and stormwater plans, monitoring for algal blooms that may increase with climate change, and providing masks to the community when wildfire smoke was unhealthy.

Just like the city and county, people can help by both preparing for climate impacts, and working to reduce our community's greenhouse gas emissions. Some of the ways individuals can prepare for climate impacts include taking measures to protecting their homes from wildfires and flooding, preparing for emergencies in general with emergency supplies at home, and reducing water use in their homes and yards.

We are fortunate to have low GHG electricity locally, and our state has passed a law requiring all electricity to be carbon-neutral by 2030. So, our best opportunities to reduce greenhouse gas emissions are to reduce our burning of fossil fuels – such as the gasoline we put in our cars, and the propane or fuel oil we may use to heat our houses. We can reduce the gas going into our cars by reducing the miles we drive by using transit, bikes, carpooling, combining trips, etc. And we can share with our local government agencies how they can best help us do this. Other opportunities to reduce gasoline usage is to purchase an Electric Vehicle (EV) or plug-in electric - many used EVs are now available, and there are more and more options for electric pick-up trucks. (You can learn more at https://jeffersoncan.org/electric-vehicles.)

There is work at both the city and county level to plan more for sea level rise in the next year. Also, the county is currently in the process of updating its Hazard Mitigation Plan, and most of the climate impacts listed above are included in it, as well as opportunities to reduce those risks. Additionally, the CAC has kicked off two working groups that are working on how we can reduce emissions through reducing the miles we drive in the county, and how we can help speed the transition to more electric vehicles.

Sustainable tourism is a wonderful way to engage those who visit us to do so in a way that reduces greenhouse

gas emissions, particularly from cars. There are lots of opportunities to have visitors come here in cleaner ways, including leaving their car at home and taking transit here. carpooling for festivals with others, etc. It is exciting to see the Chamber of Commerce focus on sustainable tourism!

The Climate Action Committee, which besides the city and county includes a variety of other organizations in the county, was formed specifically to work crossorganizationally on reducing greenhouse gas emissions and preparing for impacts, see the county website for details (https://www.co.jefferson.wa.us/637/Climate-Action-Committee). But varied facets of climate change are being worked on by many organizations across the county, from the Port Townsend Marine Science Center, Local 20/20, Jefferson Land Trust, Students for Sustainability at Port Townsend High School, North Olympic Salmon Coalition, and more! It is hard to imagine an organization or business that is not part of the solution, whether it be preparing for impacts or reducing our use of fossil fuels.

On your next trip to Seattle why not take the bus? It's now possible to depart Port Townsend and arrive in Seattle in less than two hours for as little as \$10. Starting late February, Jefferson Transit will begin direct service to the Kingston Ferry Terminal, giving the passengers the opportunity to either transfer to the passenger only Kingston Fast Ferry to Seattle by Kitsap Transit or catch the auto/passenger ferry to Edmonds by Washington State Ferry.

The six-month pilot project will provide cross-sound travelers a reliable and economical way to visit Port Townsend and Jefferson County while minimizing the carbon footprint to this very bike-friendly community! This project will also help reduce the vehicle congestion along Hwy 305 on Bainbridge Island.

The Kitsap Transit board recently passed a resolution to work jointly with Jefferson Transit to promote and

The Port Townsend community and beyond can look forward to both familiar programs that have been paused since the pandemic and the introduction of some exciting, new offerings. We're thrilled to invite folks back to our campus, with COVID-precautions in mind, to experience it all.

A robust schedule of Boatshop, Navigation, and Seamanship classes are already underway with a number of new offerings including classes for new boat owners. The newest addition to our NWMC family, the Swan Hotel, has allowed us to connect our learning opportunities with lodging to better accommodate outof-town participants (don't worry, it's still a hotel, too!). And for Port Townsend visitors and locals alike, we're excited to be offering new boat tours this summer more on that in the coming months!

Included in the cooperative agreement is a "first month free" fare program to ride Jefferson Transit's Kingston Express bus route and to sail aboard Kitsap Transit's Kingston Fast Ferry to Seattle. Beginning opening day for the first month, the passengers can obtain a transfer ticket from the PT-Kingston Express bus driver and ride on the Kingston Fast Ferry to Seattle free of charge.

Jefferson Transit's new service, dubbed the Kingston Express, will depart twice a day, Monday – Saturday from the Haines Place Park & Ride. The morning departure at 7:15 am and the afternoon at 2:45 pm. Transit time is an hour and twelve minutes, with Kingston arrival times of 8:27 am, and 3:57 pm. The bus will be making stops at the 4-Corners Park & Ride and the Gateway Visitor Center at the intersection of Hwy 19 & Hwy 104. The bus will be departing Kingston at 8:42am and 4:12pm to Port Townsend and will be making the same two stops in between. Bus arrival times at Kingston allow travelers adequate time to board either the passenger-only ferry to Seattle or the auto/passenger ferry to Edmonds.

Jefferson Transit's Kingston Express and Kitsap Transit's Fast Ferry cooperative pilot project connecting Port Townsend to Seattle via public transit adds a new and exciting way to travel cross-sound. It also includes bike racks on the buses and increases your ability to enjoy the Peninsula without the cost of driving and hassle of parking. It's better for the environment and helps reduce highway congestion!

Jefferson County PUD discusses broadband plans

After years of planning, discussion, and a few changes in state law, Jefferson County PUD is making its first steps towards providing fiber internet to electric customers in Jefferson County thanks to a pair of grants from the State of Washington.

The first grant, \$1.09M from the Public Works Board, pays for the construction of fiber optic cable to 70 homes near Hwy 20 between Four Corners Road & Sunset Lake Rd and along Anderson Lake Rd.

The second grant, \$9.7M from the WA State Broadband Office, along with a \$750K match provided by Jefferson County, connects 650 homes in 3 zones: between Cape George Rd along Discovery Bay up to Middlepoint Rd; in the Woodland Hills community between Hwy 19 and Kala Point; and on Marrowstone Island.

Home and businesses in grant-funded project areas who agree to have fiber installed to their homes will not pay for any of the construction and installation costs. Monthly internet service from the PUD will begin at \$65 for 100/100mbps. Gig and better speeds will be available. Discounts for customers enrolled in the PUD's Low-Income program will also apply.

Offering internet service is new for the PUD. It only became legal in Washington State in July of 2021. Prior to that time, the PUD could build fiber to a customer, but another entity had to turn it on. Because the PUD only builds open access networks, homes and businesses that receive grant-funded fiber will have the option to receive internet from any eligible service provider that chooses to operate on the network. The PUD currently has multiple service providers that use existing PUD fiber to connect around 50 business customers around the county.

In April or May the PUD will begin opening enrollment for service to eligible homes in the project areas. Enrollment will only be open for a limited time. Homes that do not sign up for fiber installation during the enrollment period will likely have to pay construction costs if they elect to connect to fiber at a later date. The PUD expects to begin installing fiber in the second half of the year. Because of supply chain issues and labor availability, project completion is not anticipated until 2022 or the first half of 2023.

The PUD's overall goal is to facilitate broadband internet service connections for all residents in the PUD's electric service territory lacking access to speeds of 25mbps down and



3mbps up over a wired line.* The PUD has already applied for \$11.5M in funding from the federal government to build fiber to over 1600 homes from Quilcene to Gardiner; and is in the process of submitting a similar-sized application to another federal agency for funding to build fiber to nearly 800 homes from Chimacum to the end of the Coyle.

The boundaries of each grant area were set to prioritize construction where only DSL connections are available, and where average speeds fall far below 25/3. The PUD does not have plans to build fiber to residential areas that have access to existing cable or fiber internet at this time. However, as federal grant rules are currently being revised, and funding becomes available for areas with higher speeds of service, the PUD will revisit its plans.

This fair will have representatives from over 40 local businesses that offer a variety of employment opportunities from summer jobs to longer term internships and apprenticeships.
